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MACHU PICCHU, PERU





GRANADA, SPAIN

Granada is the capital city of the province of Granada, in the autonomous community of Andalusia, Spain. Granada is located at the foot of the Sierra Nevada mountains, at the confluence of four rivers, the Darro, the Genil, the Monachil and the Beiro. Ascribed to the Vega de Granada comarca, the city sits at an average elevation of 738 m (2,421 ft) above sea level, yet is only one hour by car from the Mediterranean coast, the Costa Tropical. Granada is home to the The best time to visit is in Mavenchanting Alahmbra. This magnificent sight is hard to sum up with a few words: The Alhambra is a palace, castle, summer retreat and enclosed town all in one enchantina place. It was built during the 1200s and 1300s for the Nasrids, who ruled the the Emirate of Granada in the final centuries of Muslim control in Andalucia After the "Reconquista" it also became the royal court of the Catholic Monarchs, Isabella I and Ferdinand II.

SALAMANCA, SPAIN

Located two hours from Madrid, Salamanca is home to one of Europe's oldest universities and is declared a World Heritage Site by UNESCO. In the heart of downtown, enjoy a historic stroll past Plaza Mayor, Casa de las Conches and two iconic cathedrals - Catedral Nueva de Salamanca and Catedral Vieja de Salamanca. Full of hidden treasures, spot the astronaut carved into the façade of the New Cathedral or test your luck finding the hidden frog on the University of Salamanca's façade, a popular student tradition for those hoping to pass their exams. Full of student life, there is no shortage of experiencing Salamanca's cuisine and nightlife. From cured meats to cheese and wine, Salamanca offers numerous restaurants to taste test limitless tapas and sweets. Nearby on Calle Toro and Calle de Zamora, get lost shopping for clothes, shoes, accessories, jewelry, souvenirs, art and local handcrafts. By Robin Rectenwald

Salamanca is home to Europe's first University. The University of Salamanca was founded in 1218, making it the oldest university in Spain.

TIPS & TRICKS

Because Salamanca is situated on the top of a mountain next to the Tormes River, be sure to purchase tickets to leronimus. The towers of Salamanca Cathedral, to enjoy a 360-degree view of Salamanca.



MEXICO CITY, MEXICO

Mexico's capital city is not only one of the historic centers of Latin America - home to Mesoamerican ruins and the Zocalo, with a cathedral built by 16th century conquistadors - it has become a booming hub in the art universe, and is considered by some in the art world to be the art capital of Latin America. The region's oldest capital city plays host to Zona Maco, an annual art fair that features galleries from across Central and South America. The city itself teems with examples of the region's architectural innovators, including Luis Barragan and Mario Pani, and its walls have been painted by some of the most famous muralists of the 20th century: Diego Rivera and David Alfaro Siqueiros. FUN FACT

The city was nicknamed "the city of the palaces" (la ciudad de los palacios) after a German noble visited in the 1800s, writing home that Mexico City could rival any capital on the European continent.

TIPS & TRICKS

The neighborhoods of Roma and Condesa are popular for travelers looking to stay in AirBnBs. The app Rappi is a must-download, and used by residents to order delivery for everything from food to groceries and household items Make reservations to tour one of Luis Barragan's homes or the beautiful Casa Organica in advance of your trip. The Infatuation has published an excellent guide to food in/around the city.



MACHU PICCHU, PERU

FUN FACT

The early bird gets the worm in Machu Picchu - JUNTOS recommends going in the early morning to avoid crowds and ensure you get the best view of the iconic Incan archaeological site

TIPS & TRICKS

Getting to Machu Picchu is quite the adventure: Fly into Cusco, take the marvelous Hiran Bingham train to the Aguas Calientes town, and then, a bus ride will take you to the sacred entrance of Machu Picchu and you can start

THE SALT CATHEDRAL OF ZIPAQUIRÁ, COLOMBIA

The Salt Cathedral of Zipaguirá or la Catedral de Sal de Zipaguirá, is an underground Roman Catholic church built within the tunnels of a salt mine 660 ft underground in a halite mountain near the city of Zipaquirá, in Cundinamarca, Colombia. By Catalina Cast

FUN FACT

The cathedral is broken up into 14 small chapels connected by tunnels. Each chapel represents the statio<mark>ns of the cross, or</mark> Jesus Christ's last journey before crucifixion.

TIPS & TRICKS

The Cathedral is about 30 miles from the center of Bogota. Be sure to give yourself at least two hours to explore everything the cathedral has to offer. To be sure you get the most out of your experience, consider booking a guided tour!

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CULEBRA, PUERTO RICO

Isla Culebra (Snake Island) is an island, town and municipality of Puerto Rico and geographically part of the Spanish Virgin Islands. The island of Culebra can be reached by private boat, the Culebra Ferry, or airplane. Culebra is a popular tourist destination for mainland Puerto Ricans, Americans and residents of Vieques. Culebra has many beautiful beaches including Flamenco, Tamarindo, Zoni, and Resaca beach. By Megan Otera

FUN FACT

Culebra totals a little over 10 square miles and served as a U.S. Naval base until 1975. More than 20% of Culebra has been preserved as a National Wildlife Refuge for more than 100 years. The refuge serves as a habitat for endanaered sea turtles and seabirds, among other creatures

TIPS & TRICKS

If you are planning to visit, here are a few things to keep in mind:

1. Take a taxi to and from the ferry terminal or ask your resort if they offer a shuttle service.

2. If you do bring your car, get there by 7:30 a.m. and park strategically, either close to the booth or close to the ferry don't get caught in the middle.

3. Purchase your tickets at the ferry booth a few hours before your scheduled departure and then play some more on the island.



LOS ROQUES, VENEZUELA

Los Roques is an isolated and magical archipelago, and in my opinion, one of the best beaches in the world! This oasis is actually a national park that hosts over 50 species and aquatic ecosystem. Highly recommend visiting Los Rogues if you are looking for perfect beaches and an escape. Los Roques has a deserted island feel to it, in the best way possible. As a Natural Park, the island development is strictly controlled, there are no mega resort complexes, but rather small, island inns: no vehicles. everything is walking distance.

TIPS & TRICKS Fly into Gran Roque, the main island, in a short 40min flight from Caracas

Research and book a quaint inn or "posada" in Spanish, in . Gran Roque.

Most posadas include all vour meals (homecooked and freshly fished), boat rides to the smaller islands and everything you need during the day (chairs, umbrellas, ice, etc.)

ROATÁN, HONDURAS

Roatan is an island located in the Caribbean, off the eastern coast of Honduras. The island lies on the Mesoamerican Barrier Reef System, making it a popular destination for snorkeling and diving. Roatan is also home to beautiful beaches, making it a perfect getaway to relax, explore, and learn about the rich history and cultures found on the island. By Daniel Peláe

FUN FACT

The Mesoamerican Barrier Reef System is the second-largest barrier reef in the world! The reef extends approximately 700 miles, ranging from the Yucatan Peninsula in Mexico to the Bay Islands. Despite the official language of Honduras being Spanish, Caribbean English is the most common language spoken in Roatán because it was an English colony before it became part of Honduras.

TIPS & TRICKS

Aside from renting a car. taxis and water taxis are popular modes of transportations for tourists on the island! The climate in Roatán is hot and humid, so it is recommended to pack light clothing for comfortability.



PAPALLACTA, ECUADOR

Papallacta is a small town high in the Andean mountains, about a 2 hour scenic trip away from Quito, the country's capital. Termas de Papallacta, a resort famous for medicinal hot springs, includes a restaurant, spa, hot spring access (of course), and other activities. It's the perfect place for a weekend treat or even just a few hours to let the stress melt away. Papallacta's hot springs are heated by the Antisana volcano and lies not far from the Cayambe volcano. These are just two of the Ecuador's dozens of volcanoes, including Mount Chimborazo which is inactive. Although Mount Everest is the highest mountain on Earth when measuring from sea level, Mount Chimborazo is the point on Earth that is closest to space due to the uneven shape of the earth and its position just beneath the equator.

TIPS & TRICKS

If you decide to stay at Termas de Papallacta, just know that their classy cabins have heated floors and the private hot springs you get 24 hour access to tend to be empty at night. For a more affordable option, it is also fairly easy to find lodging in town or simply make it a day trip! There are regular buses between the two cities.

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GALAPAGOS ISLAND, ECUADOR

A haven for wildlife and wildlife-lovers, these protected islands provide sanctuary for an incredible amount of animal species year-round. Witness sights like penguin or flamingo migrations, meet world famous tortoises, and experience beauty - above or below water - like no other. The biodiversity in these world-famous islands give the Galapos their world renouwn. For the adventurer, there are numerous options for local stays as well as liveaboard cruises. *By Marcos Marti*

FUN FACT

TIPS & TRICKS

97% of the Galapaaos is a national park. The Galapagos have incredible biodiversity, including several active volcanoes. You can follow Charles Darwin's footsteps by exploring the same islands and sites he visited back in 1835. Less than 79,000 visitors tour Galapagos on liveaborads annually. In the Galapagos there is a lack of natural predators, so creatures have very little natural fear of people (although visitors must remain at least 2m away from wildlife).

Due to conservation efforts. there is a limit to the amount of yearly tourists that can travel to the Galapagos, so book early. Every tourist party must be accompanied by a conservation specialist in protected areas - so plan accordinaly. Take a bike tour, plan a hike, there's as much to do above and under water. Local tourguides can take snorkelers and scuba divers to the best locations to swim with seals, sea turtles, and even see sharks! Discounted travel rates varv vear-round, but vou can visit the islands year-round.



CABO POLONIO, URUGUAY

Cabo Polonio is a small beach town, situated in an area of great natural beauty which still retains typical features of the Uruguayan Atlantic coast from prior to the expansion of the traditional urban tourism model. The authenticity and charm is unique! An off-the-grid gem hidden in South America. The beautiful beaches, endless sand dunes, seals sunbathing without anything to bother them, and it's historic light house will leave you speachless! *By Bruno Giordano*

FUN FACT

The town does not have electic power or running water. It's part of the charm! Being able to see a stary night without any ligth interference is priceless!

TIPS & TRICKS This is a summer destination, so

keep in mind the best time to visit is between December and March. I highly recommend going for the weekend while visitng Uruguay. There are little hostels and houses for rent for short periods of time, but you'll have to book in advance as availability is very limited. If you are a true adventurer, and nature lover, spend a week there, it is the ideal place to disconnect for the world, and connect with nature!



TORTUGERO, COSTA RICA

Tortugero National Park dominates the northern coast of Costa Rica and is largely known as the Costa Rican version of the Amazon rainforest. This area is a series of rivers, canals and jungles drawing in a large variety of wildlife - most known for its large turtles. You can particiapte in canal cruises, go fishing, go canoeing or even go for an adventure hike through the thick raindorst and experience the over 800 species of wildlife. *By Angelica Sanchez*

FUN FACT

Tortugero means 'Land of the Turtles' as this area is largely known for its large turtle population. This area is one of the country's most important nesting sites for the Leatherback, Loggerhead and Hawsbill turtles. The best time to visit thiis area is in April and May as that is the time the wildlife comes into the area.

TIPS & TRICKS



PANAMA CITY, PORTEBELO/ COLON, PANAMA

This relatively small but long and narrow country, bookended with the Pacific and Altantic oceans is much more than a Canal attraction. The city is a mix of cosmopolitan sophistication and all that brings- great restaurants, nigtlife (Casco Viejo rooftops parties are amazing), fitness culture (Cinta Costera on a Sunday morning or Parque Omar for a class), global diversity of the people. Panama has one of the most racially and ethnically diverse populations. Over 70%+ of the population are a mix of indigenous, African diaspora, Spanish and Asian ethnicities. A U.S. historical military, economic and political influence and US currency has contributed to its popularity as a destination for bio diversity lovers, digital nomads and retirees.

TIPS & TRICKS

If you are in Panama City, take a ferry to Tobago Island for a day at the beach. Then, take a hike in the Gamboa rain forest and plan a weekend trip to El Valle Anton for beautiful waterfalls and mountains. Visit or plan a weekend in Portobello in the Colon region and visit Casa Conga to see the African historical influence and to see the famous Black Jesus and hear the stories of how he arrived in this area and the annual pilgrimage honor him annually. Then, island hop into amazing Caribean seas and fried fish dishes. While on that side of the country, take a trip to San Blas to learn more about the Guna people and the history of the Molu.



SALTO ANGEL/CANAIMA, VENEZUELA

Salto Angel is the world's tallest waterfall, and it is in Venezuela's Canaima National Park. It is famous for water falling from a height of almost 3,300 feet or 1000 meters, with an uninterrupted drop of 2,647 feet or 806.8 meters. Canaima National Park is very special because of its natural diversity, it is home to many plant and animal species. Because of its difficult access, it is yet to be explored in depth for the discovery of new species. By Eugenia Soto

FUN FACT

Many mountains in the Canaima region have a flat top and are called "Tepuyes" meaning "casa de los dioses"/ "house of the gods" in the native Pemon language. The tepuis are some of the <mark>oldest geological</mark> formations in South America. Because tepuis are high above the forest, they are home to some spe<mark>cies of animals and</mark> plants found nowhere else on Earth. Abo<mark>ut a third of the</mark> vegetation in the mountains is endemic. The national park has inspired many books and movies, two of the most famous examples are Sir Arthur Conan Doyle's book The Lost World and the movie Up.

TIPS & TRICKS

The town of Canaima is the starting point for all excursions to el Salto Angel and other nearby attractions. Since there are no roads to get to the town you have to fly. The cheapest way to get there is by taking a flight from Puerto Ordaz or Ciudad Bolívar, and its usually done in small planes. To get to el Salto Angel or any other excursions, you need local guides. For some you have to navigate a river for more than 3 hours and only the guides know how to get there. It is also part of a protected reserve.



PUERTO ESCONDIDO, MEXICO

Puerto Escondido is a port town on Mexico's Pacific Coast in the state of Oaxacca. Although it's one of the most popular destinations on the Oaxaccan coast, Puerto Escondido retains its rustic and relaxed atmosphere, as evidenced by the lack of large resort chains. The most popular activity in Puerto Escondido is to beach-hop between the city's 8 unique beaches to enjoy the different restuarants and activites that they offer. Additionally, the area surrounding Puerto Escondido boasts hot springs, bioluminescent bays, lagoons, and a national park, Lagunas de Chacahua. By Meaghan Flores

FUN FACT

Puerto Escondido is also Mexico's premier surfing destination. Playa Zicatela, one of Puerto Escondido's 8 beaches, is home to the Mexican pipeline, one of the largest and best surf breaks in the world. Every May, surfers from all over the world flock to Zicatela for the annual Surf Open Puerto Escondido.

TIPS & TRICKS

Additionally, Puerto Escondido is home to a large amount of sea turtles each year. In the interest of their protection and study, the Centro Mexicano de la Tortuga (Mexican Turtle Center) is in charge of operating sea turtle protection camps on the Oaxacan coast. If you visit from June to November, this research center offers travelers the opportunity to assist in safeguarding the Olive Ridley and Leatherback turtles between June and November During this time, you are welcome to join the beach patrols that collect eggs and release baby turtles
